The Vine and Branches

Recently I've been pruning trees and clipping hedges as growth on these plants slows with the coming of winter. This has perhaps been good preparation for the gospel this Sunday, in which Jesus describes himself as the vine, us as his branches, and our Father in heaven as the one who prunes the vine (not that I'm claiming any close similarity with the latter). It is one of many bucolic metaphors that Jesus uses of himself and his mission in the gospels – evidence the shepherding motifs from last week's gospel. The message is quite clear – I think; we are productive and flourish in life so long as we remain in close relationship with Christ, following his example of faithfulness towards the Father's mission even when that entails pruning of the things that are holding us back from this purpose. Our Lord allowed his life to be pruned and shaped by the Father to an extent that has not been seen before or since. We are still in the process of remembering and celebrating the most radical reshaping that occurred in Jesus' life, namely, his death and resurrection. It would not be right to say that the Father 'pruned' Jesus' life away by causing him to be crucified so that his resurrection might give us assurance of God's power to save from death, but it is reasonable to say that the Father clipped/ shaped/ pruned Jesus' life to the point where our Lord could faithfully accept the physical death that inevitably comes when pure goodness intersects with a world of selfishness and fear. Assurance that this path leads to life came in the resurrection of Christ from the dead, knowledge of which impelled the disciples forward. We see one of these early disciples, Philip the Evangelist, in action this morning (Acts 8:26-40). The pattern of Jesus' life, death and resurrection had become the key by which Philip understood the Hebrew scriptures and allowed him to unlock prophecy from those scriptures in a decisive way, moving his hearers to become branches on the vine, that is Christ, tended by God the Father. **Tony Surman**
