There are two themes running through today's Services which overlap to quite an extent. One is the theme of Christ as the Good Shepherd and the other is the theme of ANZAC remembrance – it being 106 years to the day since ANZAC forces began their invasion of the Gallipoli Peninsula in 1915. As we all know, the campaign did not go well for the ANZACs, with several thousand being killed for no gain whatsoever. Among that number were some very promising young men from our Parish, whom we remembered specifically in 2018 on the centenary of the Armistice. On ANZAC Day we also mourn the loss of parishioners in subsequent wars. One of these was Bill Tudhope who died in 1942 as a prisoner of war on an Italian ship torpedoed by a British submarine. His memory is kept alive each year with the delivery of a wreath to St Mark's by his family. We sit the wreath in front of the prayer desk that Bill's family also donated to the church in his memory. In chapter 10 of John's Gospel, Jesus is described as the Good Shepherd who lays down his life for the sheep. This morning's second reading from the First Letter of John echoes that thought and extends it to Jesus' disciples who, like their master, are called upon to lay down their lives for one another. The young people of this parish who went to war believed themselves to be fighting for noble causes, consistent with the Gospel, and their deaths were understood as sacrifices consistent with the principles set out in John 10 and 1 John 3:16. When we look back at the conflicts we have been involved in, with the benefit of hindsight, we might question the worth of some of these fights, but we dare not question the motivation and courage of our people who fought in them. May they rest in peace and rise in glory.
