Water has rich symbolic resonances in the Bible. It is associated in both the Old and New Testaments with cleansing, healing, renewal, growth and prosperity. There is a darker side, however, to water as a symbol in the scriptures. Right at the beginning of the Bible, in the first account of Earth's creation (Genesis 1), water is present in vast quantities, representing the chaos from which God would fashion an ordered universe. Psalm 107 bears witness to the enormous power of the sea which, during storms, has waves that ascend to the heavens and descend to the depths (v26) causing sailors to 'reel to and fro, and stagger like drunken men,' until they are 'at their wits end.' (v27) Clearly there was considerable cultural unease about oceans and lakes, but there was the recognition as well that, ultimately, God was in control of even the most violent storm (v25), and that when beleaguered sailors call out to the Lord, 'he makes the storm be still, and the waves of the sea are hushed.' (v28) The unwilling prophet, Jonah, and the zealous apostle, Paul, were both beneficiaries of God's sovereign power over the might of raging seas – Jonah being saved from the depths by a whale or great fish (Jonah 2:10), and St Paul and his shipmates being plucked miraculously from the jaws of death when their prison ship founded off the coast of Malta (Acts 27). In our day, the sea has become less of a threat to people in the western world, because we have had the good fortune of being able to develop technology to protect ourselves on it. Even though the sea might be a bit less frightening to us than it was to our ancestors, our lives are not free of anxiety. In fact, anxiety disorders across all age groups in developed societies are frequently reported in the media. There is just as much need for the people of this generation – including ourselves – to hear and experience the commanding words of Christ speaking into the chaos of our lives, 'Peace! Be still!'
