The Bread of Life: We continue our journey through chapter 6 of John's Gospel this morning. It is rather a long chapter which reports on an important juncture of Jesus' public ministry in which bread is the symbol of focus. Last week we heard about the miraculous feeding of the multitude (5000) that followed Jesus' giving thanks for a small amount of bread and fish. This Sunday we hear the first part of a sermon he gave in Capernaum in what we can only imagine was a synagogue packed to capacity with the people who had pursued him from the other side of Lake Galilee because they had witnessed the feeding miracle. In his preaching he refers to the way that God had fed the Israelites in the wilderness, with bread (manna) from heaven – we hear about this in the first reading this morning. In a controversial move he compares himself to that bread, and claims that anyone who comes to him will never be hungry or thirsty again. From that point – where our gospel today ends – the audience begin to get more concerned. The tension rises when Jesus claims that those who 'see the Son and believe in him will have eternal life '(v.40), and when he says that people must not only come to him for salvation but eat him (v.51) – as the bread of life—many people decide that Jesus is not their 'cup of tea.' Jesus, of course, was speaking metaphorically, about the need for people to be one with him – in heart, soul and mind – in the mission, cause or purpose that God has for the world. He was talking about the need for communion - spiritual communion - with him and the one who had sent him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, into the world. Each Sunday we take bread and wine and give thanks to God for them, which calls to mind not only the Last Supper, but Jesus' teaching at this point in John's Gospel. The purpose of this act of Eucharist (Greek for 'Thanksgiving') is to maintain the bond of union between the Father, our Lord and ourselves. It is a spiritual union, signified by simple elements with the deepest of meanings attached to **Tony Surman** them.
